- Welcome to the Make Our Schools Safe club (MOSS)! We are happy to have you join our amazing team...
- You are now a part of a group of hundreds of teens around the country committed to school safety, leadership, service projects, fostering of mental health, and peer inclusion.
- Latest findings state that 51% of students feel that their own school has a false sense of security*. That information, coupled with the fact that nearly 27% of students feel that their feedback regarding school safety is taken seriously, is reason enough to establish a Make Our Schools Safe club!
- Mental health is also paramount for the existence of a MOSS club. It is an important process through which students understand and manage emotions, set, and achieve positive goals, feel, and show empathy for others, and both establish and maintain positive relationships.
- A MOSS club's emphasis on peer support and inclusion is essential.
- Instituting a club in your own school helps to create a culture of safety within your own school. The success of the club will depend on your leadership, vision, and commitment to school safety.
- Your commitment to volunteerism and connection to community and country have brought you to this moment.
- You spend an average of 180 days a year on your school campus. Make them count!

WHAT IS THE MAKE OUR SCHOOLS SAFE (MOSS) CLUB?

MOSS clubs are comprised of a group of dedicated students who embody the principles and guidelines of the non-profit organization, whose mission is to empower students and staff to help create and maintain a culture of safety and a positive school environment. MOSS clubs pledge to support the purpose and platform of the organization by increasing the participation of all students involved. The club members dedicate themselves, exhibiting adherence to the following guidance of the Mission, Vision, and Action plan of the organization. MOSS students focus on building resilience within their own school community.

Mission: To empower students and staff to create and maintain a culture of safety and vigilance in schools.

Vision: Created after the tragedy at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School on February 14, 2018, **Make Our Schools Safe** is dedicated to driving and guiding best practices in school safety. Taking action through **P.O.W.E.R!**



Preparedness- knowing the threats and hazards schools face, planning and training for emergency responses to those threats and hazards, knowing and correcting vulnerabilities (thereby mitigating/preventing those threats and hazards, events, and incidents).

Observation- situational awareness and decision support.

Willingness to act- preparedness response training for students

Education- knowledge of response protocols and drills.

Response- responding and recovering from threats and hazards as trained and planned for, building campus resiliency.

CLUB GUIDELINES

Make Our Schools Safe will be referred to as MOSS. The MOSS club is a group of dedicated students that embody the principles and guidelines of MOSS. The club pledges to support the purpose and platform of the nonprofit Make Our Schools Safe by increasing participation of all students. The club will focus on empowering students to use their voices. "Your Voice is Your Power!", said Lori Alhadeff, President of Make Our Schools Safe.

1. Election of a board will be either at the end of a school year (for the following school year) OR at the very beginning of the school year. Meetings will be held twice a month.
2. There are no annual dues. Rather, we ask each club to **DESIGN THEIR OWN T-SHIRT**, and then ask a business in the community to sponsor/pay for said MOSS club t-shirts for each club member. The sponsor's logo can be displayed on the shirt. Students can [click here](#) to design and purchase their club shirts.
3. Have a Speaker at your MOSS meeting to speak about school safety. For example, you can invite your Chief of Police, SRO, Guidance Counselor, or a retired famous sports player.
4. Produce and host one security fundraiser per school year, with a clear vision of how these funds will be allocated for a safety project at your school. For example, put a Stop the Bleed Kit in every classroom.
5. Perform community service on behalf of MOSS and in memory of Alyssa Alhadeff.
6. MOSS Clubs are encouraged to discuss active shooter and fire drills with their SRO and Principal. How can we improve response?
7. MOSS Clubs will promote See Something, Say Something!
8. All MOSS club members will participate in Live for Alyssa Day on May 1st (Alyssa Alhadeff's birthday). Each club will decide how to participate.
9. MOSS clubs shall not discriminate because of race, creed, color, ethnicity, national origin, age, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, personal appearance, disability, family responsibility, socioeconomic status, political affiliation or source of income, or other rights secured by the First Amendment of The U.S. Constitution.

EXECUTIVE BOARD POSITIONS

All elections will take place in school by paper or hand-raised ballot under supervision of teacher sponsor. Each person running for each position will be given five minutes to speak on behalf of his or candidacy.

- President – will set the vision for the MOSS club, call, and preside over all meetings and enforce observation of all club laws/policies
- Vice-President – will assist the President in performance of duties and will succeed the President if they are unable to carry out their responsibilities.
- Secretary – will keep records of attendance and minutes of meetings, communicate with students on event logistics, help develop and retain club membership, and communicate with student activities regarding event logistics.
- Treasurer – will keep accurate records of all funds received and expended
- Social Media/PR – will run the club's social media accounts on Facebook and Instagram, and will respond to all messages on MOSS social media accounts


CO-PRESIDENT

LAUNCHING YOUR MOSS CLUB

Planning your first meeting:

- Let your student body know that a MOSS club exists in school
- Set up a time and date convenient for greatest number of persons who can attend
- Schedule approximately 10 meetings per school year, one every two weeks and plan them out for all interested members at the start of the year
- Every year, each MOSS Club will be given a \$500 gift card to be used to meet the needs of the club. For example, buying snacks, pizza, water, and project supplies.
- Organize the subject matter you'd like to include in the first meeting
- Introduce yourself
- Do a mindfulness activity to set the tone
- Elect board members
- Do an icebreaker activity
- Talk about activities centered around getting Alyssa's Law passed nationally or statewide

- Plan a security fundraiser for your school

AGENDA MAKING

Create a detailed agenda with timing for your first meeting. Have snacks and water available. Here is sample agenda for a MOSS club's initial meeting:

3:00 PM Call to Order + Introduction by President

3:05 PM Icebreaker Activity

3:15 PM Explanation of the Mission and Vision of MOSS

3:20 PM Peer-to-Peer Discussion: Discuss a safety or school-related question. Such questions include:

- What is most important to you regarding safety at your school?
- How can we spread kindness and stop bullying on campus?
- What could we be doing to better secure our campus?
- How can we fundraise to support our new idea?
- What projects can we work on to safeguard our school?
- How can we advocate for Alyssa's Law?

3:35 PM Community Service Project: Find a way club members can serve your community! Some ideas include:

- Hang posters with school safety tips and statistics around campus
- Paint kindness rocks and place them around the school
- Connect with a local elementary or middle school
- Fundraise for Stop the Bleed Kits
- Film a school safety PSA
- Leave notes of encouragement around school

3:50 PM Mindfulness Activity: Before the meeting ends, guide the group in a mindfulness activity like a meditation or breathing exercise.

3:55 PM Meeting Wrap-Up + Time for Questions



INVENT2PREVENT

Invent2Prevent is an innovative, experiential learning program that challenges high school and college students to create and implement their own dynamic products, tools, or initiatives to address acts of targeted violence, hate or terrorism in their specific communities. Teams compete at the high school level for awards of \$5,000 for first place; \$3,000 for second place, \$1,000 for third place.

Five students from the Pompano Beach High School Make Our Schools Safe Club traveled to Washington, D.C to compete in the nationwide Invent2Prevent competition! This group had the opportunity to present more about their school safety project to a panel of Department of Homeland Security executives, subject experts, and esteemed academics. **Pompano Beach MOSS Club earned the title of 2nd in the nation!**

Their initiative, known as "Bonding Buddies", aimed to eliminate social isolation and foster relationships amongst Pompano Beach Elementary School youth by pairing older students with younger ones as mentors.

While in DC, the Pompano Beach MOSS Club members also visited Representative Jared Moskowitz's office. After returning from the competition, students from Pompano Beach MOSS Club were invited to speak on Local 10 WPLG about their experience competing in Invent2Prevent, meeting with Representative Moskowitz, and serving as leaders in their communities.



SERVICE PROJECT IDEAS

- Ensure that every student and teacher in school is aware of and has downloaded a **Safety App** of some kind (this will vary depending upon where you live). Look for apps that allow anonymous submission of information. See Something, Say Something!
- **Create a School Safety Survey** that can be distributed to all students and teachers (with the Administrators' approval) to identify pressing safety concerns within your school campus.
- **Inclusion of all students in your school is paramount to creating a culture of school safety.** Develop a school safety protocol/plan for those students with developmental differences and learning disabilities. These students may have needs which require more support and assistance in emergency situations.
- **Promote the idea of community, leadership, mentoring, and safety by adopting a local elementary or middle school.** High school MOSS club members can visit these schools and discuss safety drills and safety education with the young students.
- **Organize a Stop the Bleed Training Day at your school.** Contact the local Fire Department to inquire about setting up a group training in your area.
- **Bring in a Guest Speaker to speak to your club.** The local Sheriff, State Senator or Representative, or even a highly regarded mental

health specialist can provide an interesting experience.

- **Visit your state capitol to lobby for passage of Alyssa's Law.**
- **Arrange for club students to be interviewed by the school newspaper staff.** Listening to meaningful thoughts and feelings of your peers can be quite inspiring and motivating!
- **Plant a Memorial Garden** in honor of those lives lost at MSD on February 14, 2018.
- **Hold a Stop the Bleed Kit Fundraiser**

School Safety Donation

Each school year, every MOSS club will have the competitive opportunity to apply for a school safety donation. These funds will be earmarked for the specific safety measure for your school for which you apply.

MOSS Club Member Scholarship

Each school year, one graduating senior MOSS club member will have the competitive opportunity to apply for an Alyssa Alhadeff MOSS scholarship. The candidate will submit a paper of 500 words (by March 1st of their graduation year detailing the ways in which MOSS has impacted their life. In order to apply, please create a 45-second video testimonial explaining how MOSS has impacted your life. Video submissions should be emailed to lori@makeourschoolssafe.org.

School Security Grant

Include a detailed submission of your school's security project, detailing costs, project, and approvals. Grant application in appendix. Due March 1st of the year for which you are applying.




Invent2Prevent

Invent2Prevent (I2P) is an experiential project that challenges high school students to create and activate their own peer-developed initiatives, products and tools to prevent targeted violence and help create safe schools and communities. All participation is free of cost.

What Students Do

- Use resources on program website portal
- Conduct primary research
- Develop creative online project

- Implement, execute, and analyze project
